You are the most important part of any curriculum, activity, or experience you offer in your program. Your daily interactions with children play a key role in how they learn to think, reason, and communicate. This reflective full-day workshop, based on the book *Powerful Interactions* (Dombro, Jablon, Stetson, 2011), will guide you through simple strategies to help you create a more intentional and individualized program.



Step 1: Be Present... Slow down and be intentional in your interaction Step 2: Connect... Acknowledge and validate the child to awaken trust Step 3: Extend Learning... Stretch the child's knowledge and understanding



After the training, individuals may choose to participate in onsite technical assistance to help you put new information into practice, evaluate progress, and sustain change. Assistance is provided at no cost to Registered and Licensed programs in Jefferson and Lewis Counties.

Attending JLCP Workshops

<u>Registration & Payment:</u> To register for training, register online or complete a registration form and submit with payment, where applicable, to CAPC by mail or in person at least 3 business days prior unless otherwise noted. Accepted payment: cash, check payable to CAPC, money orders, purchase orders and EIP Award Notice. If you receive EIP scholarship for training for which you have already paid, CAPC will issue a reimbursement. You are responsible for any difference between the award amount and the cost of the class and payment must be received prior to class.
