PIWI is a relationship-based model emphasizing parent-child interaction as both the focus and context for understanding and promoting children's development. PIWI can be used for home- based services, parent-child groups and socializations in a variety of settings including early intervention, Early Head Start, and parent-child play groups. Participants will learn about, discuss, and practice all components of PIWI, including the philosophy, dyadic and triadic strategies, and developmental observation topics.

The Pyramid Model was developed at the Center on the Social and Emotional Foundations for Early Learning (CSEFEL). It is a conceptual framework of evidence-based practices for promoting young children's social and emotional competence and for preventing and addressing challenging behavior.

The infant-toddler modules are designed for professionals working with children from infancy to three - years.

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Child Development Associate (CDA) Training Opportunity

Are you ready to begin the process of earning the Child Development Associate (CDA) credential? Jefferson-Lewis Childcare Project is offering a CDA preparatory course to help you reach that goal! This class will provide you with training in each of the CDA subject areas and guidance with the preparation of your professional portfolio. Classes will meet weekly at Community Action Planning Council. Participants will be given assignments to complete between classes as well.

At the completion of this course, participants will be able to:

- Identify components of a safe, healthy learning environment for young children
- Describe teaching strategies that promote children's physical and intellectual competence
- Describe teaching strategies that promote children's social and emotional development
- Recognize positive methods of guiding children's behavior
- Explain the importance of establishing positive relationships with families
- Discuss approaches to managing a purposeful program for young children
- Explain ways to demonstrate a commitment to professionalism

In addition, participants will receive hands-on guidance with preparing the Professional Portfolio and completing the other requirements prior to applying for the CDA Credential.

What Makes Behavior Challenging?

A child's behavior has meaning and is trying to convey a specific message. It can show a need or want, a lack of stimulation, or a need for more professional assistance. How we respond to a child's behavior is just as important as understanding the reason behind it. During this training we will discuss what makes certain behaviors challenging for adults, what makes them challenging for child care programs, and strategies that can be used to manage these behaviors.

Everyday Literacy

Early literacy involves listening, talking, printed language and writing. Adults can support a child's literacy skills in many ways that don't require expensive curriculum books or videos. In this workshop we will explore the concepts of early literacy, discuss how young children learn, and share ideas for building literacy during daily routines.

Communicating with Families

Are you struggling to connect with the parents of the children in your program? This workshop will give you a chance to assess your family communication and relationship-building strategies, and examine ways to encourage more parent participation in your program.

Active Supervision

Providing safe supervision of the children in your care is a top priority, but it's not always easy! If you're feeling especially challenged when it comes to supervision this workshop is for you. We will discuss your challenges, develop strategies, and design plans to ensure children are always supervised.

The Move from CPSE to CSE

As children move from preschool special education services (CPSE) to school-age special education services (CSE) it is important to be aware of the changes that will occur. This training will provide information on the process and how to support the family throughout the transition.

How to Respond to Biting

Biting is a normal part of development for children. It is used to convey how a child is feeling or a need or want. Biting can also be frustrating when we don't know why the biting is happening or how to prevent it. In this training we will look at why young children bite, how to respond in an appropriate way and discuss specific strategies that can be done to help prevent a child from biting. This can also be a stressful time for parents, making communication strained or tense. Along with strategies for preventing and responding to biting, we will also discuss how to approach parents in a positive way that supports them and their child.

Promoting Problem-Solving Skills

Where groups of children are together, conflict isn't far behind. Your responses to everyday disagreements and disappointments can help children learn to solve their own problems. This workshop will provide some simple strategies to empower children, reduce challenging behavior, and create more peaceful, happy moments in your program.

Supporting Preschoolers with Special Needs

Autism. Developmental Delays. ADD/ADHD. Speech/Language Delay. Sensory needs. Do you know what these are? Do you know red flags to watch for? Would you know how to work with a child who has special needs? Do you know what support they may need? Do you know how these conditions influence learning and behavior? This training will answer these questions and more.

Caring for children in family day care or group family day care program is a big responsibility. The health and safety of children in care is the highest priority for both the provider and for the New York State Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS).

Health and Safety training is developed by the Early Childhood Education and Training Program in collaboration with OCFS. Jefferson-Lewis Childcare Project staff are approved to deliver this training for Family and Group Family Providers, Day Care Center and School Age Program Staff, and Day Care Center and School Age Program Directors.

Attending JLCP Workshops

Registration & Payment: To register for training, register online or complete a registration form and submit with payment, where applicable, to CAPC by mail or in person at least 3 business days prior unless otherwise noted. CAPC is not responsible for payments that are left with or handed to anyone other than Admin. Office Staff. Registration forms can be found at www.capcjc.org/programs/jlcp/training/. Accepted payment: cash, check payable to CAPC, money orders, purchase orders and EIP Award Notice. If you receive EIP scholarship for training for which you have already paid, CAPC will issue a reimbursement. You are responsible for any difference between the award amount and the cost of the class and payment must be received prior to class. All checks returned to CAPC for insufficient funds subject to current returned-check fee. Post-dated checks not accepted.
