Community Action Customers

Fiscal Year: October 2017 - September 30, 2018

- 5,964 unduplicated individuals served
- 2,083 unduplicated families served
- 951 volunteers contributed 18,026 hours of volunteer service
- 12,143 volunteer hours contributed by individuals living in poverty

Each customer is counted only once during the year, even though multiple services are frequently accessed.



Family Center Services

619 families received income tax preparation services, collecting refunds totaling **\$746,369**

16 individuals were provided with support services allowing them to gain/maintain employment or education

1,898 families were provided with emergency food through the Food Pantry

1,756 families were assisted through SNAP (Food Stamp) application process

58 Families gained knowledge of gardening and nutrition

781 children received a nutritious lunch during the summer months when school meal programs are not available

174 children provided with winter outerwear

2,058 children received gifts at Christmas

41% of individuals served are children under the age of 18

61% of households served live at or below 100% of the poverty level

2% are homeless6% live with family or friends

1% do not have health insurance

20% of individuals age 24 and over have not graduated high school

19% are single-parent families

9% of families served have at least one member of the household who is active duty or a veteran

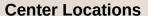

Medical and Dental Care

328 enrolled children were up to date with age appropriate preventive and primary care to include immunizations

231 newly enrolled children received developmental and sensory screening

61 children were diagnosed as needing medical treatment/follow-up

60 children received medical follow-up

310 children received a professional dental exam

70 (23%) children were diagnosed as needing dental treatment

57 (81%) of those children received dental treatment

86 children with diagnosed disabilities served



Key Accomplishments 2017-2018

100% enrollment throughout the year.

We continued to have 3 certified CLASS (Classroom Assessment and Scoring System) observers on staff. 100 % of our Master Teachers have at least an Associate Degree in Early Childhood Education. 71% have a Bachelors or Masters Degree in Early Childhood Education or related field.

100% of the Teacher Assistants have a CDA or an Associate Degree in Early Childhood Education 5 Teacher Aides completed the CDA Program.

90% of our families received financial literacy education this year and 21% set a financial literacy goal. We purchased a new 18 passenger school bus to replace an older one.

Our centers were all enrolled in the Quality Stars New York Program and received provisional ratings between 4 and 5.

Started up 2 new licensed classrooms at our Sacred Heart Head Start site in September 2017. Transitioned our School Readiness Roundtable forum to the North Country Alliance for Early Childhood Education - Birth - 3rd grade to include involvement from several school districts, daycares, and community stakeholders.

Every \$1 invested in Weatherization Assistance returns \$2.78 to the household and society

Weatherization saves families with low-income an average of \$250 - \$450 per year in heating, cooling and electric costs.

2018 Revenues & Expenditures

Community Action Planning Council is subject to a comprehensive financial audit each year. The most recent audit (October 1, 2017 – September 30, 2018) was reviewed and approved by the board of directors on February 21, 2019. An independent auditing firm found the agency to be in compliance within all program areas and reported no weaknesses or deficiencies with fiscal practices or internal controls. 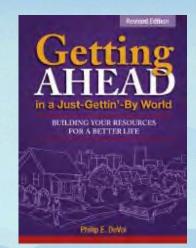
'Getting Ahead' is a hyper-local approach to reduce poverty in communities. Getting Ahead was developed from the book Bridges to Sustainable Communities which led to the 'Bridges out of Poverty' educational framework. Getting Ahead is a 16-week adult education workshop series in which a 12-14 person cohort investigates the causes and solutions to poverty in their lives and their community. Cohorts met once weekly. Participants- or "Investigators" are empowered to take control of their lives by analyzing their experiences and their community together in 'kitchen-table' discussions with their facilitator. At the end of the series, participants created their own goals to "get ahead" and agreed to provide progress reports to the host agency for approximately one year after graduation.

Community Action Planning Council of Jefferson County recruited 35 participants, referred to as investigators, who processed the Getting Ahead curriculum and shared valuable information about how poverty operates in our local community. Investigators were paid for their time in the form of gift cards, child care, assistance with transportation and meals.

There were 35 graduates in 2018 who achieved the following:

- 8 are now trained facilitators
- 1 holds a part time facilitator position
- 1 is currently holding a board seat at Community Action Planning Council of Jefferson Co., Inc.
- 3 have purchased a vehicle, (not from a buy here pay here dealership), 1 is volunteering at Community Action Planning Council of Jefferson Co., Inc.
- 1 is on the Bridges Steering Committee
- 1 is on the Race Against Poverty Committee
- 3 report they have built a relationship with a bank and are rebuilding their credit

- 1 participated in the first-time home buyers education course
- 1 participated in the Bridges out of Poverty workshop
- 5 are now volunteering in the community
- 1 earned their high school equivalency (TASC)
- 2 are enrolled in college
- 1 completed vocational training
- 1 is enrolled on vocational training
- · 1 completed drug court
- 15 gained employment (5 have full-time with benefits)
